

# How to pay in your money



There are lots of ways to pay in the money that you raise, so just choose the one that suits you best. Once we've received the funds you've raised, you'll get a big thank you from us!

## Website

The easiest way to pay in your money is by making a donation via [sickchildrenstrust.org/donate](https://sickchildrenstrust.org/donate). Just fill in the donation form online and include details of your event, and you're all done. You will receive a confirmation to show that your payment has gone through.

## Online fundraising page

The funds that you have raised through your online fundraising page will go directly to us without you having to do anything. We are registered with Facebook, JustGiving and Virgin Money Giving. Just set up your page using one of these services and select us as your charity, and you're done.

You can also pay in the funds that you have raised offline using online fundraising pages. Just deposit the cash into your own bank account and then donate that amount to the fundraising page.
